Gino's bridge accomplishments include Bronze medalist in the Rosenblum Cup, European gold medalist, ACBL Blue Ribbon pairs runner-up three times, Spingold knockout team runner-up Israel, and winner of the Israeli Open Team Championship seven times.

Meet your 3 new members of CCBA Board of Directors

Three new faces were elected to three-year terms on the CCBA Board at its Annual Meeting last month. They are Joe Connelly, Jamie Rubenstein, and Steve McConnell. Re-elected were incumbents Suzi Subeck and Jan Churchwell. Each year five members are chosen for the 15-member board.

The three new members said they were looking forward to being on the board because they are interested in serving, and in promoting bridge.

Joe's background includes assisting at CCBA tournaments, serving as partnership chair twice at WinterFest and FallFest, and as tournament chair at this year's WinterFest. He was elected 2020 treasurer of the board.

Joe, who owns the Mundelein Area Duplicate Bridge Club, reports it is going strong. Like many in the game, he played as a young man and then took a break. When he resumed playing bridge in 2008, "my partner and I used the old Goren style of bidding, such as strong 2's. lol"

Today, he uses the modern conventions, and has even become an ACBL Certified Bridge Instructor.

He plays in several tournaments annually, but one he remembers well was FallFest.

"I was playing with Bill Sommerfield, a regular at my club, and we came in first in a field of 90 pairs with a 64 percent game. We earned over 16 silver points!"

Jamie, who moved to the Chicagoland area from Phoenix, said he was president of a unit board there, and was editor of its monthly newsletter. He would like to "enhance and enlarge the news format for the online website to make it more timely and more blog friendly."

"I expect to draw on my experience as a newsman, reporter and editor," he said.

Jamie believes by improving publications, "new players would be attracted to what bridge players do and how bridge clubs operate."

"We need to go online and get the message out that bridge is fun, whether it be on our own unit website, on Facebook, or determine which social networks have the most traffic in which young or old players might participate." Also, Jamie would like to publicize online the activities of all the college-based clubs.

Steve is interested in serving on the board because he wants to improve the game and make it attractive to more people. "I'm an apostle for the game." To promote bridge, he believes the board needs to develop a relationship with high schools and colleges to get bridge included in the curriculum.

Regarding tournaments, he thinks attendance could be increased "if we could better automate the game like they do in Europe, and if we could have venues that are more geographically accessible to a high percentage of players."

Steve's favorite story about a novice experience concerns a hand he had in Fresno, CA, when he first began playing duplicate. His left hand opponent had opened a weak two hearts, his partner squirmed for about 30 seconds, and then the right hand opponent passed.

"I only had five points, but bid two spades because I knew, due to my partner taking so long to bid, that she had points. This was followed by a loud 'director,' a call I had never heard before. I explained to the director that it was obvious that my partner had a problem and had cards. Little did I know that was a no, no. Looking back, that incident was pretty funny."


This information was produced on August 6, 2019 in Horn Lake, MS. Masterpoints won after this cycle will not impact flight eligibility for these events.

Club qualifying games are permitted at Unit discretion but are not required at any l level of competition. A Flight B or C team may qualify under the rules of any Unit where a plurality of team members reside.

Players who are currently, or have ever been members of another bridge organization - domestic or foreign - must submit information on their past and/or current ranking in that organization.

An entry in the Championship Flight is a commitment to play in the National Final. Any teams representing District 13 at the National Event will receive a stipend paid at the NABC. For more complete information, consult your conditions of contest on the District 13 website.

BIDDING QUIZ

What would you bid with these hard hands on each auction below?

We all have very hard hands from time to time. Sometimes it's best to be conservative with modest hands, even when distributional. Sometimes it's good to be aggressive with a good distributional hand and partner shows a fit.

What does responder's bidding show and what do you bid as South in each of the following sequencess?

- 1. 1NT This is a slight underbid by a point, but nothing is better. You don't want to support partner's black suits without proper support, but are also flawed to bid NT with no diamond stopper. In a recent bidding poll, most experts bid 1NT as the best bid.
- 2. 3NT Partner's double showed support for all unbid suits, so he has a fit for diamonds likely with one or two honors. It may be appealing to consider jumping in diamonds. Given you have two spade stoppers with a long source of tricks, you should bid 3NT yourself.

- Some examples for partner's hand $\triangle x \lor$ AKxx $\triangle Axxx & KJxx$, or $\triangle x \land AQxx \land$ QJxx AJxx.
- 3. 4NT or 6♠ Partner's four spade is opener's strongest raise, about 19+ points in support of spades. With a void, you rarely will learn all you need from 4NT, but I cannot imagine that slam will not be a good bet. In fact, if partner had raised to only two spades, slam might be possible, so bid on. In fact, 6♠ is cold and 13 tricks are possible with careful play.
- 4. 4♥ You have a 10-card fit with little defense, but bidding 4♥ makes it much harder for either opponent to enter the bidding. In fact, your opponents are cold for 5♦ but neither one can easily bid it and you are also cold for 10 tricks in four hearts!
- 5. 4♦ North's four clubs is a splinter bid, showing a strong raise (19+ in support of hearts), and four hearts with a singleton or void in clubs. You don't have a big hand, but it fits very well with partner in that you have no wasted values in clubs and a 5th heart which is huge for slam. Partner could easily have something like ♣ AK2 ♥ KQ82 ◆ KQ1093 ♣ 8, which makes slam virtually cold for 12 tricks, and partner can take over and bid 4NT. If you just bid four hearts, partner will rarely bid again.

Winning with Wimpy By Jim Diebel

Suppose, with no one vulnerable, you pick up ★ 9763 ♥ 7 ♦ KQT52 ♣ K84. Partner opens 1NT (15-17) in first chair. With eight prime high card points, a good five-card suit, and a singleton heart, you probably plan to bid 2♣, (Stayman) and then bid or invite game in either spades or NT. It's a fine plan. Suppose, however, that when you bid 2♣, your LHO doubles, showing club strength. Partner bids 2♠. Do you still go to game, only invite, or after reevaluating your hand, do you downgrade to a pass?

It appears your *K is poorly placed, and may not be pulling its full weight. Wouldn't it be nice to know if your *K was worth anything?

On the first hand, Declarer only needs to hold his spade losers to one to come to 10 tricks. A double-finesse in spades is a 76% favorite. On the second hand, after a club lead, I would expect Declarer to lose the first three club tricks and eventually a heart.

The first hand has 15 HCP and the second has 18. Clearly, it doesn't matter nearly as much how many high card points Declarer has, but rather, where they're located. In this column, I'm going to suggest a treatment that could get you to better contracts, and consequently, better results.

Suppose you open 1NT, partner bids 24, and RHO doubles. Traditionally, passing the double tends to show four decent clubs and a willingness to allow partner to play 24x if Responder's hand is suitable. A redouble shows five good clubs and strongly encourages Responder to sit for it.

You could still use the redouble to show 4-5 good clubs, but the meaning of PASS has changed. Opener now uses PASS to deny a club stopper. Therefore a 2♥ or 2♠ rebid promises four cards in that major and a club stopper. A 2♠ rebid promises a club stopper, but denies holding a four-card major.

If Responder has values to invite or to bid a No Trump game, he need not worry about whether or not partner can stop clubs. Opener's non-pass promises he can stop that suit at

least once. That's easy enough. The problem arises when Opener passes (denying a club stopper), and Responder still wants to investigate a major suit game.

This part is a little trickier, but if you can master the sequences, I can promise you a few tops in your future. Our auction, so far, has been:

1NT Pass 2C Dbl**Club
Pass** Pass ??
(*Club strength, ** No club stopper)

Responder can sign off in a suit at the two level if he has five, or can choose to ask again using a redouble. This does NOT in any way suggest a desire to play 2Cxx. It simply asks Opener (again) about his major suit distribution.

Opener, of course, can opt to convert partner's request by passing at his own peril. This is generally a poor idea, since Responder might hold as little as ♣ 9763 ♥ 7542 ♦ 86542 ♣ -, and is running for his life.

Next comes the hardest part to remember. Since Opener has denied a club stopper, it becomes strategic to prevent the left hand opponent from leading a club through the club holding Responder might hold.

The only way to accomplish this is to find a way to make the Responder the Declarer. If the final contract is No Trump, this is impossible, since Opener has already introduced that strain. Our new goal, therefore, is to get Responder to introduce a major if we are going to play it there. Following the redouble, here is how it's done:

Opener's third bid following the redouble:

2D = 4 Hearts, but not 4 Spades

2H = 4 Spades, but not 4 Hearts

2S = No 4-card major; minimum point


2N = No 4-card major; maximum point count

3C = Both 4 Hearts and 4 Spades; minimum point count

3D = Both 4 Hearts and 4 Spades; maximum point count

You can think of this as similar to having Opener use a transfer sequence. This treatment allows Responder to not only accurately place the final contract, but more importantly, to have it played from what could possibly be the necessary side. Consider the hand with which we started this

discussion:



I realize I've given South a pretty favorable hand, but the point is illustrated well. Had South responded 2S to the first Stayman inquiry, whether or not North bids four spades, the defense should take the first four tricks. East wins the first three clubs, and the fourth club gives West a trump promotion. Played from the North, East finds himself on lead with the club suit not looking particularly attractive. Say he tries the \blacklozenge 7, (as good as anything else); Declarer wins the ♦A, cashes the ♥A, and ruffs a heart. Back to the A, and ruff another heart. He now draws trump and claims 12 tricks: 6 spades, 5 diamonds, and the ace of hearts.

A club lead would have done no better. Neither would a trump lead. NS gets a well -earned top by playing the hand from the North. This hand may seem contrived, but when the Opener has no club stopper, playing the hand from the other side will rarely hurt and may often gain.

Switch the &K and the &J. Now East can defeat four spades with the lead of a low club, but that seems unlikely. East can hold the contract to five by playing the &A and another club. In practice, East will often have a broken club sequence, not knowing that his partner holds the key missing honor. It is not unlikely that East will elect to make a passive lead in another suit, allowing NS to run off a bunch of tricks when the defense had winners off the top. This situation won't come up often, but if you can maneuver the contract away from the Opener, you may reap some real rewards.
