Support Your Club, Earn **Points by Playing online**

ACBL members can play with other ACBL members in a specially created pairs game on Bridge Base Online (BBO) and earn black masterpoints.

The table fee is \$5, with the majority of the money going back to your home club. Although it is not now possible to play in games limited to your local club, the ACBL is working to develop a way that will make that possible. To play, log into your BBO account. If you do not have one, you will need to create one. Next click on "ACBL World" and then click on "Support Your Club ACBL Black Point Game"BBO instructions are available online.

Another option is the Daylong Tournaments, solo events played with robots. Register anytime and you have until midnight Eastern time to finish the 18 boards. The fee is \$6. The ACBL notes these are a temporary solution to what is hopefully a temporary problem.

Important News Regarding Tournaments

Dear CCBA Players,

In the best interest of our members' health and in compliance with the State of Illinois's directive that limits non-essential gatherings during the pandemic, CCBA has decided to cancel the Stars of Tomorrow Tournament for 499ers that was scheduled for May 2 and 3. A decision will be made later as to whether it will be rescheduled.

Also, the District 13 Spring Regional Tournament set for April 13-19 at the Grand Geneva Resort and Spa in Lake Geneva is cancelled. Another tournament in District 13, Unit 222's Milwaukee Spring Sectional planned for March 26-28, was not held due to the coronavirus.

- Exploration of "replacement" Spring NABC events, including North and will release details as soon as possible.
- In the meantime, here are some options to play for masterpoints online while we work on specialized online avenues.
- We are communicating with club, Unit and District leadership. Please
 be on the lookout for updates about games, health advisories and more
 directly from your local club, Unit and/or District.

The Fakeout Double

(A Convention Created by Lindsay Cantoni and Nancy Seamster)

The Cantoni-Seamster Convention, better known as Fakeout Doubles, has become the rage in the world of bridge. It started with two far-sighted bridge players, Lindsay Cantoni and Nancy Seamster, in the vibrant Sun Lakes, Arizona community. The popular convention then spread to the professional bridge-playing community where now no partnership is complete without Fakeout Doubles. You may want to add this powerful convention to your partnership agreements. Since this famous duo is in our unit, it would be ideal to have them autograph your convention card as I have. This could be worth a lot of money in the near future.

Fakeout Doubles (with a nod to Takeout Doubles)

When the opponents open the bidding and you have fewer than 10 high card points, double to tell partner you have less than your fair share of points. With this information, partner will know you have a poor hand and will bid as follows:

• Bid the next suit up artificially with a balanced hand asking you to bid your longest suit, finding the safest to play.

For example, you hold \$987 ♥2 ♦QJ7643 \$852

N You S Partner
1H Double Pass 1S*
Pass 2D All Pass
*artificial asking for your longest suit

• Bid 1NT (artificial) showing two places to play. You will bid your lowest three-card suit.

Partner will pass or correct which you will, of course, then pass or correct.

For example, you hold ♠K87 ♥Q1042 ♦J43 ♣Q52

N You S Partner 1S Double Pass 1NT* Pass 2C* Pass 2D Pass 2H

Pass 2 *artificial

The flip side advantage of this convention is apparent. In the absence of a Fakeout Double, Pass shows 10+ points. Partner then bids as cheaply as possible with 0-10 HCP, jump bids with 11-13 HCP or makes a game-forcing cue bid of the opponent's suit with 14+ HCP. Since you usually hold fewer than 10 points when the opponents open the bidding, you will be able to double more often. Everyone enjoys bidding more, so this will increase your enjoyment of the game. Both the Fakeout Double and the pass in second seat are Alertable bids. This means every time the opponents open, partner will alert your call sowing confusion in the minds of the opponents which will further increase your enjoyment of the game.

Experts have scrutinized the value of this new convention and have unanimously endorsed its use. Rumor has it that once the convention makes its way through the bridge-playing masses across the U.S., it will quickly become standard bidding and the Alert requirement will be dropped.

Winning with Wimpy By Jim Diebel

Go to www.wimpy.biz/ bridge for practical tips on bidding, play, and defense.

The time between composition and publication can be quite lengthy, and as I write this month's column, I am only one day removed from the weekend of the Flight A Grand National Teams, in which my team lost in the finals to a very good team comprised of a pair of local players and a pair from Wisconsin.

I frequently find that if I followed my own advice more often, I'd have much better results. The advice I give most often, and coincidentally, the advice I disregarded a couple of times over the weekend, is to count. The answer to virtually every problem you will ever encounter at the bridge table could be solved if you simply take the time to count. Consider this hand from the qualifying round. No one vulnerable:

I (South) opened 1NT, and after a transfer, ended up in four spades. West led the ◆3, (3rd/5th) and this looked suspiciously like a singleton to me.

Unwilling to lose to a doubleton ♠Q in the East, and then lose a diamond ruff and possibly two clubs, I chose to start trumps by leading low from my hand, intending to play ♠K ♠A, and lead up toward the ♠J.

This looked safest, since unless West started with AQXXX, a singleton diamond, and East had the AA, I would be okay. (If West switched to a club, I would rise with the king.) This was rewarded when West showed out of spades. I won the AK, and led a spade toward my AA 9. East was forced to put in the A10 to keep me from winning the A9.

I won the AA, and for some insane reason I thought I should strip East of diamond exits before putting him in with a spade. So still (stupidly) thinking West had led a singleton diamond, I led a diamond to dummy's jack.

The retribution was swift and merciless. East ruffed, put his partner in with the A and got another diamond ruff. The Q was the setting trick.

How different this hand plays if I stop to count my tricks. I should have realized that WEST was the danger hand (I didn't want a low club lead from West), but his only possible entry was &A.

If I had stopped to count my tricks, I would have realized that I could lead the \$9 from my hand, and never lose more than two spades and one club to make 10 tricks. At the other table, East made a lead directing double of North's two heart transfer bid, and West raised to three hearts. This got doubled and they escaped for only -1 and -100. I turned a seven imp gain into a four imp loss.

This later hand was perhaps the one that broke our collective backs. Everybody vulnerable, I pick up ♠ J73, ♥ KQ843, ♠ AJ4, ♣ K5. My partner passes, and RHO opens one spade. I briefly considered overcalling two hearts, but opposite a passed hand and holding spade losers, it would have been a poor idea at IMP scoring. The auction continues: pass, pass and partner re-opens the auction with two clubs. RHO now bids two hearts. Suddenly things are looking up.

Partner either has really long clubs or close to an opening hand. Also, he may have some spades (he didn't reopen with a double). I tell him I have a good hand with great hearts by doubling. I don't know where the opponents will go, but I'm pretty certain that they can't play it here. Perhaps partner will be able to double something later.

To my astonishment, West passes! If partner was nearly broke (with very long clubs), he would have pulled the double. This rates to be a massacre! I lead the ♣K, and dummy comes down.

North's IMP decision to pass in first seat was questionable, for even with a minimum, he would like a club lead on defense, and he has a

comfortable rebid over anything I might say. I chose not to overcall 2H op-



posite a passed hand, as I would prefer an extra spot card or two for safety.

The defense quickly took the first three tricks. Having to find a discard on the third club, I pitched a useless spade. I hoped partner could exit with a trump, and then I expected a bloodbath. When he returned a spade, I got my first clue that he probably didn't have a heart.

Declarer cashed ★AK and led a third spade. There was no benefit to ruff in front of dummy, so I pitched a diamond. Declarer ruffed a diamond in his hand and I began to see trouble ahead. He led another spade and ruffed it again as I pitched the ◆A. Now he led dummy's last heart and let me have it. Down to ♥ K8xx, I exited with a low heart, but he was in control.

He won and led his last spade. I could ruff it low, but now had to lead a heart from ♥K8 into his ♥A9. Two hearts doubled, bid and made.

Once again, counting could have come to our rescue. Having seen East follow to three clubs, I needed to recognize that East must be exactly 6-4-0-3, 5-5-0-3, or 5-4-1-3. With the first hand, I could expect Declarer, with four weak hearts would take his chances in 2Sx rather than 2Hx. Therefore he must be 5-5-0-3 or 5-4-1-3. Partner would have returned a heart if had one, so I should have known Declarer was exactly 5-5-0-3 and my diamonds were useless. I should have pitched a diamond.

Partner can work out that Declarer has at most a singleton diamond and switch to that suit just in case Declarer is void. Had I pitched a diamond, partner would have been more likely to find the winning continuation.

East has no answer to a diamond shift. He can ruff, cash two spades and ruff a spade, but now must tap himself a second time to get back to his hand. This tap turns out to be fatal, as now I can't be prevented from winning a third heart. (When declarer attempts to ruff his fourth spade, I ruff high and return a trump).

Our joy would have been short-lived. To add salt to the wound, at the other table, North opened 1C, East overcalled 1S, and South tried 2H. They ended up in 3NT, which, as the cards laid, was unbeatable.

So we were destined to lose 9 IMPs even if we defended properly. Allowing 2Hx to make cost us 15 IMPs, and was a major factor why our team lost in the finals!

ACBL Update regarding COVID-19

The following was sent by the ACBL to its members:

We want to keep you informed with updates as the unique circumstances of COVID-19 continue. Incidents of exposure (and positive test results) by bridge players and ACBL staff have been reported directly to the ACBL as well as in local media.

We understand your concerns about potential exposure to COVID-19. After talking with several health departments, we can provide the following information to you:

The ACBL will not release private health information of our members, including the names of members who have tested positive for the virus. However, members may publicly self-identify and, if that happens, their name can be further discussed publicly. Your club or District/Unit officials may send you notifications naming specific individuals if the person has identified themselves and provided written authorization to the club or District/Unit official. Otherwise, they may send you a general notice that a person who tested positive played at the same event as you did.

If you are concerned that you may have been exposed to COVID-19, follow the recommendations of the Centers for Disease Control by contacting your healthcare provider for medical advice.

Improving Your Play - Spots are Important

Good spots are very important when playing a hand. By good spots, we mean having lots of 9's, 8's, and even 7's just below your honor cards.

If the 98 or 987 spot card combination is together, even better.

When opponents lead secondary honors and you have split honors with good spots, cover their honors with yours in an effort to promote your good spots to winners. This is especially true when they lead a J or 10 from shortness in trying for a ruff. Note the example below:

West leads the ♦10 hoping for a ruff. Declarer must appreciate the value of his 98 of diamonds and cover West's ◆10 with dummy's J and when East splits his KQ, win the A.

After pulling trumps, South can lead his \bullet 9, forcing out the \bullet K to promote his \bullet 8 to a winner. Even without the ♦8, you could lead toward ♦9 later after pulling trump to promote that to a winner.

West leads the \$10 from his three-card sequence. In bidding, some might double two clubs with East's hand, suggesting a lead, but the clubs spots are pretty weak.

East wins the A and shifts to the J smothering the \$10, hoping partner has the 49. South must cover to promote his ♣98 into a stopper.

Summary – appreciate the value of spots in evaluating your hand during the bidding and use them in the play to create more winners. Lay out some hands with a deck of cards to see it.

Despite its decision to cancel the Spring NABC in Columbus, Ohio, the ACBL says it plans to hold its Summer NABC in Montreal, Canada, and its Fall NABC in Tampa.

The ACBL said there are no plans to reschedule the Columbus NABC for later in the year, although the city may be considered as a possible location in the future.

The decision to cancel was made "following a careful review of the order issued by local health and governmental authorities in Ohio banning mass gatherings of more than 100 people."

"We are saddened to cancel the Spring NABC and feel sympathy for the local tournament committee which has worked for several years to create a special welcome and memorable bridge experience," said ACBL Executive Director Joseph Jones, "but we must comply with governmental regulations."

The Summer NABC will be July 16-26 at the Palais des Congres de Montreal. The Fall NABC will be November 26-December 6 at the Tampa, Florida Convention Center. For more information regarding the NABC, go to www.acbl.org.

The Importance of Not Telling the Truth


We never got a second driving lesson.



This looks like a pretty normal 3NT with 13 opposite 12. Partner might have bid 3NT herself, but it looks to play better from your side with this lead. Count your tricks; you start with one spade, three hearts and a club trick. It looks like your plan will be to work on diamonds for three tricks and then take a double spade finesse for a trick (playing low now and then playing towards the nine later). Anyway, you play low from dummy and East wins the spade K.

Are you waiting for me to tell you what East leads back? Not so fast. What did you play to trick one? If you carelessly play the 2, then you can bet that a club is coming next. Let's take a look at the full deal.



Imagine you are East. You see the spade 4 lead and think "Ok this could be a four-card suit or a five-card suit" since partner leads fourth-best from length. You can see the three in dummy, but if partner holds the 2, partner will have five spades in total.

You win the king and need to decide whether to switch or to continue this suit. It doesn't feel like you have an outside entry to your clubs anymore



(and you might be sitting up a trick for declarer; picture club AQx) so it might be best to continue partner's suit. Imagine partner with spade Q10542. Returning spades will kill this contract.

If declarer plays the 2, you now know that your future in spades isn't so bright. Partner has at most 4 having led fourth-best (with no cards missing lower than the 4) and doesn't have the QJ10 so declarer likely has that suit double-stopped. Now you'll switch to a club hoping for the best, and declarer is done. Continuing spades will lead to 9+ tricks.

It's important for declarer to casually throw the spade 7 to keep the opponents guessing rather than the spade 2 which reveals everything. As declarer, concealing the truth will keep the defense from knowing that a switch is right.
