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



To be eligible for overall Gold Points, Regional Events are offered daily as two-session events... however, if a player wishes to play in only one session, we will accommodate them. The decision to play one or two sessions MUST be declared at the time the entry is purchased. "Change of mind" will not allow a player with a good morning score to turn a one session entry into a two session entry at halftime!!

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Jim recalls experiences at Grand National Teams competition



Winning with Wimpy By Jim Diebel

There are players who just always seem to do poorly against me. They're good players and they are winning players, but for some reason ,something always goes wrong for them and I'm the beneficiary. It could be that I got to a lucky contract, or they bid to a good place only to be thwarted by some crazy distribution. For whatever reason, I just seem to have their number.

When I was starting out, there were a great many players who had my number. Even though at tournaments, I mostly competed in Flt B events, when I played in Swiss Teams or club games, I could count on leaving certain tables a bit bloodier than when I had arrived.

As my game improved, there were fewer and fewer pairs that "owned" me. Even at National levels, I often held my own against some of the top names in our game. There is an exception. As far back as I can remember, it seems I've always come away 2nd best when I played the Gardners. Whether it was Craig and his late wife Mary, or, less often, Bob and his regular foil, Dick Bruno, I can perhaps count on one hand the number of times I've left their table with a good score.

Of course, some of the time = Craig would volunteer it's most of the time=it's been because I'd shot myself in the foot, but you have to give them their due. They are, and have always been, among the best the city had to offer.

Craig, in addition to being a great player, is one of the nicest people you are likely to encounter at the table. Bob is just a great player. Please don't take this the wrong way. Of all of the bridge players I have ever known, there is no one I respect more than Bob Gardner. He may appear to be blunt, indifferent, and humorless, but he is also truthful and insightful. Don't ask him a question unless you want to hear what may be a painful truth. Perhaps the best way I can describe Bob. is that he does not suffer fools. Ask him a stupid question and you can expect a dismissive answer. Simple acknowledgement from Bob Gardner is high praise indeed.

Anyway, back to my story. My partner and I were playing against Craig and Bob in the Grand National Teams a few weeks ago. In the qualifying round, you had to play 8 boards against all the other teams to determine which 4 teams would advance to the semi-finals. At unfavorable vulnerability, I picked up: ▲AJ5 ♥ --- ♦T8753 &QJT62. Bob, on my right, opened 1D.

This event was scored in IMPs, like a team game, so it is imperative NOT to put yourself in a position to get doubled for a big penalty. Ordinarily, overcalling clubs with a hand this light is borderline suicidal; however, I felt there were two things in my favor. 1) If the opponents wanted to compete, it was going to be harder over a 2C interference than over a pass, and 2) The opponents likely had a heart fit and that suit was breaking poorly for them.

Another point to keep in mind is that if I left these two alone, they were favorites to get the best spot. I overcalled 2C and breathed a sigh of relief when Craig responded 2S. I'd gotten my lead director in, they were a level higher, and finding the best landing spot was going to be difficult for them., Unfortunately, my partner didn't get the memo that I was only kidding and blasted to 5C. Bob doubled and that ended the auction. I've been doubled by Bob many times over my bridge career. I can't recall a time when I'd ever made one of them, and I braced for the worst. Craig led the $\bigstar K$ and this dummy came down.

I won the Ace in hand and played a diamond to the Ace. I ruffed a heart back to my hand and ruffed another diamond, noting the $\mathbf{\Phi}Q$ from Craig. I continued the cross ruff, with Bob having to follow to all 5 dia-



monds. When I led dummy's last heart, I was able to score my ♠Q "en passant" for the 11th trick.

I noted that an initial trump lead would have foiled my crossruff. I was not surprised to later learn that Craig didn't have any clubs. If he had, I am confident he would have led one. The whole hand:

This hand occurred during the 1st session. The format for the event dictated that we play 4 boards against every team and then another 4 boards in the 2nd session with a different set of boards.

Unsurprisingly, the board numbers were the same as the 1st session. Board 19 comes along and I pick up a powerful hand: ♠AK ♥ AK32 ♦JT5432 ♣A.

Bob passed, and I opened 1D. Craig overcalled 1S, my partner passed, and Bob raised to 2S. Despite holding a weak suit, I felt fairly confident bidding 3D. Craig competed to 3S, and my partner suddenly came to life with 4D.

Bob bid 4S, which I felt certain I could beat, but if partner held a diamond honor and perhaps the ♥Q, I might be a favorite to make 5D. I bid 5D which got passed around to Bob who doubled. The opening lead was the ♣J.

OMG! Was lightning about to strike twice on the same day? After 4 hapless decades of giving these guys my lunch money, was this going to be the day it turned around? Decide how you'd play the hand before reading on.

I could see that my only possible losers were 1 diamond and 2 hearts. I could afford to lose one heart if I could ruff the other heart high in dummy. With that in mind, I won the A and led a diamond to the queen, delighted to see Craig follow. Bob won the **•**K and shifted to the ♥6. I didn't care who held the $\mathbf{v}Q$, so long as the suit broke no worse than 4-2.

In retrospect, by that logic, I should have ducked the heart, but I rose with the Ace, and cashed the King, expecting to give up a heart and claim. Bob ruffed. Eventually, Craig won the $\mathbf{V}Q$, and I went down one. Note that ducking the heart doesn't work either, as Craig simply gives Bob a ruff. Where did I go wrong?

I learned an important lesson from Eddie Kantar many years ago. When a contract looks too easy, think about what might possibly go wrong. I should have given more thought to the distribution of the whole hand. The opening lead sure looked like a singleton. Bob didn't try to give his partner a club ruff, so Bob probably held all the missing trumps. If Bob had 6 clubs and 3 diamonds, AND was able to raise spades, he couldn't have any heart length. One winning line would be to win the **V**A, draw trump, and lead a heart toward the ¥J9

Alternatively, if I was going to try to ruff a heart high, I should have attempted to keep high diamonds in dummy. One winning line would have been to lead a high diamond from my hand. This would necessitate that I trusted that Bob had at least 3 trumps.



else a club return could prove embarrassing. With a heart return, I can win the Ace, cross to dummy with another trump, and lead a low heart from dummy. Bob can ruff it or not, but if he does, it will be his last trick. If he instead pitches, I can win the ♥K give up a heart to the $\mathbf{V}Q$ and still ruff a heart high in dummy.

Our teammates defeated 5D undoubled, so we lost 100 points and 3 IMPs on the deal. We ended up losing that match by a single IMP, so making the contract would have been a huge gain. The whole hand:

Bidding clues, card combos help you decide what to do at trick 1



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
You are declarer and must decide what to play at trick one. This is rarely a simple guess – usually the bidding or a card combination will help you decide what to do. In each hand below, you are South as declarer with the bidding and lead shown.

North (Dummy's hand) is shown above yours. What is your play at trick one and why?

Can you answer these Jeopardy Questions?



Answers:

1.To decide what the right play is, South must recall the bidding. East made a takeout double, so East is the one with most of the high cards. Therefore, you should play LOW to trick one, hoping West led from the &J and East holds the &K. If this is the case, you won't lose a club trick and will make 9 tricks.

2. South's cue bid is forcing one round or more, depending on the next bids. South might have 4-4 majors and invitational strength, or a single suit with a game forcing hand. North bids $2 \diamond$ and South now jumps to $3 \heartsuit$, which is natural and game forcing. It would also be appropriate for South to just jump to $4 \heartsuit$, but rarely is slam possible. Best play at trick one is to duck the \bigstar lead, because it shows the \bigstar Q and creates a finesse later for a loser discard. If West just continues \bigstar , South should finesse \bigstar ,J and then discard \diamond on \bigstar A. Now play to \diamond A and \heartsuit to dummy to ruff \diamond , back to \heartsuit in dummy to ruff \diamond , and lo and behold they break 3-3. You have pulled trump and can discard your \bigstar losers on dummy's \diamond to make 12 tricks and a likely top board.

3. No opposition bidding, but West chooses to lead the ♥9. Look at your good ♥ spots. The lead marks East with both the ♥QJ. Therefore, cover the ♥9 with the ♥T. East plays ♥J, and you you win ♥K. Now pull trump ending in dummy to lead ♥8, and finesse if East plays low. Finesse again if the ♥Q hasn't appeared yet, and discard a losing ♣ from dummy on the ♥A. Now take the ♦ finesse. If it is successful, you will make 12 tricks, otherwise 11 tricks, losing only 1 ♦ and 1 ♣.

4. Win A and pull trump ending in South to lead a A, and finesse the A to create a discard for the losing A on the K.
